Roundup 2011 – New Format

Basically, the format will change with the exception of the food and the jamming...sounds great already doesn't it??? Mark your calendars for Saturday, February 19th from 2:00 pm to 9:30pm, and come on down to the Congregational Church of the Chimes in Sherman Oaks. The format will be very similar to the Saturday Night Hoots held at the various campouts. There will be a sign-up sheet with slots for audience participation/group songs, and more opportunity for everyone to participate in the event. Performers may be an individual or a group. The sign-up sheet will request your name(s), the song, which Hoot(s) you attend and every 4th entry on the sign-up list will be a group/audience participation song. Participants may sign up one time with one song only. Then, after everyone signs up, if there are vacant spaces, you may sign up for a second turn.

We'll be using condenser "area" microphones rather than individual ones, reducing setup time so we can have more performances. *All performers must wear nametags showing that their memberships are valid at least through 2011.* You may pay your dues at the Roundup if you haven't already sent them in by then to our membership chairperson, Pat Cronin, who will also issue nametags.

Additionally, we'll have tables for musical items you may wish to sell – including instruments, CD's, music books, and records. *Please provide your own signs*. Most importantly, we will conduct the Songmaker Board of Directors Elections for 2011 (see following article). These are the wonderful folks who donate their time and energy to make all our events so much fun and successful. So, mark your calendars right now...and I will write more information for both the Bard Chord and the E-Chord in February. 

In addition to Billings on lead vocals, acoustic guitar, and some of the harmony vocals, the album features Jennings on acoustic and electric guitars, piano, bass, percussion and harmony vocals...Robbie MacGruder on drums...Lloyd Maines on pedal steel guitar...John Carroll on piano...Brent Truitt on mandolin...and Stuart Duncan on fiddle....as well as other talented artists.

But my favorite part of this album is Billings' voice. It's just so easy to listen to! There is no melodrama...no vocal histrionics or acrobatics so common in popular music these days. It's just an authentic, pure and lovely voice that literally invites you into the singer's heart.

and unforgettable true story of "Daddy's Last Drive" to real-life recollection of her adventures on horseback in "My Caballo" ...from the personal song, "Real View Mirror," about overcoming life's disappointments, to the beautiful song about a family member finding his own way in life ("Blue Highway")...Billings' songs are filled with energy, optimism, compassion, courage and humor.

Guitar-In – Talking Guitar Blues Tom Faigin

The following article originally appeared in the November 1971 issue of the Bard Chord – Ed.

In August 1971 I got a chance to play guitar and sing on Channel 28 - but there was one catch. I had to write a song about some phase of guitar playing, since the program was an attempt to publicize the variety of courses being offered through U.C.L.A. extension. Naturally, I vacationed up until the last minute. Then I was forced to take action.

Feel free to give this song a good workout. Talk it through while you play your basic two beat strum. If you are ready for a more complicated pick, try this one:

I call this one the backward ripple because when you play it fast, it has a rippling sound. It's backwards because it goes thumbring on the 1st string - middle on the 2nd string - index on the 3rd string; then thumb-pluck. Woodie Guthrie and Cisco Houston used this strum on many of their talking blues.

If you get tired of chording along, try this little solo in between verses:

By the way, if you like to write songs, many talking blues titles

haven't been used yet. How about *Talking Pollution Blues*, or *Talking Situation Comedy Blues*, or even *Talking Tax Deductible Blues*? Of course, it helps to have a deadline.

HARMOLIN



The Harmolin is a member of the fretless zither family. Made in the 50s in San Diego, this little instrument achieved moderate popularity and was available with three bridges: a three bar (as shown) for students, a fifteen bar and a push button bar (like an autoharp). It is strung chromatically over two octaves and a series of detents on the back of the bar enable the whole structure to be moved, thus the three chords can be played in any key. A complicated "pick" is drawn up and down the apertures in the bridges and further detents raise and lower the pick to play just the notes required. The black string cover is to support the left wrist which can "damp" the notes at any time using the damper bar to the right of the guard.

An interesting, cleverly designed instrument, seen on eBay between \$50 and \$150, and also listed at Sylvan Music for \$595!
